## An opportunity to visit these historic buildings

#### 1. St Teresa's School \*

#### Open Saturday 10am to 3pm

Former Effingham East Court Manor House built in 1799 and set in picturesque estate with stunning views over the surrounding countryside. Guided tours.

### 2. Effingham Golf Club

#### Open Saturday 9am to 12 noon only

Club House is Grade II listed and dates from 18th century with later remodelling. It was Effingham Manor House from 1823. The course was designed in 1927 by the famous golf club designer, Harry Shapland Colt.

#### 3. Methodist Chapel \*

#### Open Friday & Saturday 10am to 4pm & Sunday 12noon to 4pm

Weslyan Chapel built in 1854. Village history displays. Children's activities. Astounding history of birdwatching devices.

#### 4. St Lawrence Church

#### Open Saturday 10am to 4pm. Also accessible other times.

Grade II\* listed church dating from 12th century with history displays and grave of Sir Barnes Wallis in the churchyard.

### 5. Our Lady of Sorrows Catholic Church

#### Open 11am to 4pm

Pretty church, consecrated in 1913 and funded by local resident and railway engineer, George Pauling.

#### 6. All Saints Church

#### Open Saturday 10am to 4pm

Pretty Grade II\* listed church originating from around 1100 in lovely setting with one of the finest sets of funeral hatchments in Surrey.

#### 7. Manor House School and Back to School Picnic \*

#### Open Saturday 10am to 5pm

Elegant Grade II listed 18th century former manor house extended in 19th and 20th centuries and set in beautiful gardens. Displays and self-guided tours.

#### 8. Manor Farm Tithe Barn\*
